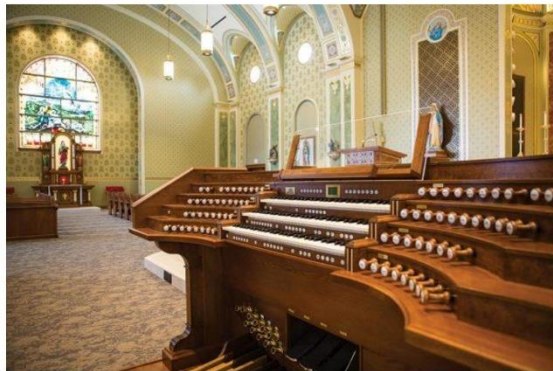

The weather is finally warming up, the flowers are starting to push through the ground and trees are starting to bud and there is sign of growth and life. The Chapter also has a couple of chances this spring to get together. This weekend we have a chance to travel to the Dells and learn about the installation of the Johannus organ at St. Cecilia Catholic Church. Come and learn and grow with each other. I know it is a little short notice, but you may just enjoy spending time with your colleagues.

The second chance I am very excited is actually happening. It has been in the works for almost 5 years already with Covid interfering several times, but this time it is actually going to happen. Dr. Jan Kraybill has a stellar program for us on May 5th, 2024, at 3:00 pm at Immanuel Presbyterian Church. You will not want to miss it! Her program is entitled The Breadth of our Breath, and it will be a truly inspiring program that you will not want to miss.

I have one last piece of business that we must cover before the annual meeting. Upon the recommendation of the nominating committee the executive board agreed that we need to amend our operating procedures. The nominating committee recommends that we reduce the size of the class of members at large by one going from 4 members to 3 members beginning next year, 2025. We would amend Article VI. Election Procedures.

3. Election of Executive Committee Members. The duly elected members of the Executive Committee shall be divided into two [2] classes, each class having four [4] members. The members of both Class I and Class II shall be elected to hold office for a term of two [2] years. Elected members of the Executive Committee shall hold office only for the term for which they were elected and shall serve until their successors are elected and officially installed. After the initial election of Executive Committee members, these members at large shall serve a term of two [2] years, one half of the members at large being elected at each election.

Amend to:

3. Election of Executive Committee Members. The duly elected members of the Executive Committee shall be divided into two [2] classes, each class having three [3] members. The members of both Class I and Class II shall be elected to hold office for a term of two [2] years. Elected members of the Executive Committee shall hold office only for the term for which they were elected and shall serve until their successors are elected and officially installed. After the initial election of Executive Committee members, these members at large shall serve a term of two [2] years, one half of the members at large being elected at each election.

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FROM THE ARCHIVES

One thing you probably know about me by now is that I spend a lot of time surfing the Archives. Always seeking to uncover ideas, discussions, events, historical facts and finds to share in PipeNotes. Well, this month I start with promoting an upcoming event; it being the Annual Meeting on May 5 at 1:30 pm and the 3 pm concert by Dr. Jan Kraybill at Immanuel Presbyterian Church. This first weekend of May actually was my inspiration to take a deeper surf into the Archives. So come along and relive a few of the creative programs hosted by the Chapter.

THE FIRST WEEKEND OF MAY

The Sunday of May 7, 1967, was a full ensemble of musical delights with a recital of the Student Contest Winners, the Spring Meeting, Election of Officers, and Honoring Past Deans. The afternoon began at 4:00 pm with the Student Contest Winners' recital at Wauwatosa Congregational Church. The chapter has supported these deserving young organists by advertising this recital to family, friends, church leaders and the general public to come hear the talents of these young organists in our local communities.

"Immediately after the recital the Spring Dinner Meeting was held in the church hall." A decision by the Executive Board of the chapter at the March meeting *"decided to pay special tribute to our Past Deans by awarding each a Past Dean's Pin at the Spring meeting. It is the intention of the board that a Past Dean's Pin be given to the retiring Dean at the conclusion of his [her] term of office. Those who have served as Dean of the Milwaukee Chapter have given hours of their time and much energy to fulfilling the goals and upholding the principles of the American Guild of Organists."* Nine of the Past Deans were present to be honored and receive their pins, five Past Deans were unable to attend, and their pins were sent to them. I have written on these Past Dean pins in a previous column, but sharing a second time is a gesture for us to express gratitude for their leadership and guiding the chapter forward.

The weekend of May 5 & 6, 1979 was a must attend chapter event, and hopefully both days! Ms. Marilyn Mason was in town to lead a master class and recital. There was also a rummage sale, the Annual Meeting and Banquet with a guest speaker. There was something for everyone to partake in at the Wauwatosa Avenue United Methodist Church. The day started at 10 am on May 5 with the masterclass. These chapter members played for Ms. Mason.

That same morning, a rummage sale was held with a special presale window of time for members of 8:30 am-10:00 am and opening the doors to the general public at 11:30 am-3:00 pm. This sale was well organized with drop off location at these three churches— Wauwatosa United Methodist, Ascension Lutheran, and Our Lady of Lourdes. Each site welcomed items for sale of organ/piano music, choral anthems, popular or instrumental music, hymnals, books on music, records, yes vinyl, magazines, and nostalgic items. Two members were co-chairs for this event, Jan Heins and Sheri Masiakowski. Might the chapter tap Sheri for her tips for planning another successful sale?

The following day, Sunday, May 6, Marilyn Mason's recital was held at the same location of the Methodist church in Wauwatosa at 3:30 pm. Members admission was free with non-members \$5.00 and students and seniors \$3.00. Here is the program Ms. Mason performed.

Ms. Mason's achievements in the music world are impressive. She held a number of "firsts" for women in the field of music. She was the University Organist and Chair of the Organ Department at the University of Michigan. Her doctorate is from Union Theological Seminary having studied with Nadia Boulanger and Maurice Duruflé. Ms. Mason was the first American woman to play in Westminster Abbey, the first woman organist to play in Latin America and the first American organist to play in Egypt. Her recitals span the five continents, and she has served as a judge at every major organ competition. The British newspapers hailed Ms. Mason's performances as "brilliance," and "artistic genius." The chapter was very fortunate to bring Ms. Mason to Milwaukee for this two-day event. The annual AGO banquet followed the recital with guest speaker of the evening, Archbishop Weakland. His topic shared was, "An Old Refrain: Pastor, Congregation, Professional Musician." For me, his sharing on this topic is timeless and was worth being present to hear!

In 1990, the Chapter "decided to try a new idea." "The Milwaukee Chapter and St. Anthony's Catholic Church" "co-sponsored Gerre Hancock in a workshop entitled 'Introduction to Basic Improvisation.'" This was a combining of efforts on many levels with a "workshop and the annual meeting for a fun time, serious time, learning time session." The weekend started on Saturday, May 5 with a luncheon served at noon in the Parish Hall after the Annual Meeting with election of officers. The group then reassembled at St. Anthony's Church for Gerre Hancock's Introduction to Basic Improvisation from 1-3 pm. "Technics that enable everyone to learn to improvise" were "presented—from the most-simple to the most complex." "Mr. Hancock's skill as a teacher of this craft combined with his invigorating presence" was "sure to get even the most inhibited organist improvising." He held a teaching position at The Juilliard School of Music in New York City where he taught courses in improvisation and "frequently" gave "masterclasses or lecture-demonstrations for AGO Chapters." On Sunday, May 6, he presented a Hymn and Improvisation Festival at 7:30 pm at St. Anthony's Church playing the 1890 William Schuelke organ, rebuilt and enlarged to 45 ranks in 1982. Mr. Hancock's program opened with

--Hymn singing led by Gerre Hancock used creative ways, including descants and splendid improvisation by him comprised a large part of his program

The St. Anthony parish choir also participated in the festival.

"The finale to the evening was the 'knock 'em dead' improvisation on *Te Deum Laudamus*."

This sure was an extravaganza weekend for music enthusiasts. Gerre Hancock was a consummate musician who possessed excellence in hymn improvisation. "Often, the word 'improvise' sends chills up and down our spine and immediately, our inhibitions are at their greatest." This weekend in the hands of Gerre Hancock was a delight for those present who heard new and fresh approaches to hymn improvisation. I can't imagine not being delighted and renewed in creative hymn playing after this hymn improvisation festival.
